Community Forest Firewood Sale Planned

The Trinity County Resource Conservation District (TCRCD) will begin accepting requests for firewood from the Weaverville Community Forest on Thursday, October 15. There are just 40 cords of seasoned Douglas fir firewood available to the public at \$100 per cord this year.

Sales will be on a first-come basis, with priority given to members of the general public residing in Trinity County. Individuals with ties to TCRCD, including employees of TCRCD or its partner agencies or their families, may not submit requests until October 26. Individuals not residing in Trinity County may not submit requests until Oct 30 for any remaining cords.

The following guidelines will apply: No requests will be accepted until October 15. There is a limit of one cord per household. Each request must be placed in person, or, if a person is placing a request on behalf of a second party, payment must be by check imprinted with the name of that second party. Requests and purchases must be made at the TCRCD office, #1 Horseshoe Lane, Weaverville.

Purchasers may pick up their firewood beginning October 16. A half-cord is the minimum that may be picked up. Trailers are recommended. Proof of purchase is required at point of pick-up in the Community Forest. All cords must be picked up by November 8. Call 623-6004 for more information.

Weight challenge to aid mill workers
